ZENA 's Journey in the PUPPY PROGRAM

Little Zena has reached a huge milestone in her journey—she is now preparing to begin her official training to become an Assistance Dog!

Zena's journey began at the Breeding Centre, where she spent her first eight weeks alongside her siblings. At a young age, she was introduced to a variety of sounds, from TVs and traffic to thunder and human interaction, helping her build confidence. Zena was one of the first to explore new places, and was quick to pick up crate training and impulse control, all of which laid a strong foundation for her future training.

When the big Handover Day arrived, Zena went home with her foster carer and met her canine companion, Lara, a Springer Spaniel. While the two of them were initially unsure about one another, they soon found rhythm and became the best of friends!

Puppy Preschool was an exciting time for Zena, where she learned and soon excelled in foundational skills like sit, drop, recall, calm greetings, and loose-lead walking. By the end of the course, she proudly received her little puppy coat and graduation certificate!

As she grew up, Zena ventured out more frequently and tackled new challenges. She visited busy streets, playground obstacles, and even bustling markets, building new experiences and confidence. Walks everyday have helped her refine her loose-lead walking, though the occasional distraction — like ducks —provided a fun test of her self-control!

Now, with months of training, socialisation, and learning, Zena is earmarked to join the Psychiatric Assistance Dog program, where she will learn the task training of a **Psychiatric Assistance** Dog.



MEET QUeenie

A MEDICAL ALERT DOG IN TRAINING

Queenie was born in August 2023 alongside her seven siblings to 2nd time mother, Daisy.

From the get go, Queenie was a favourite amongst the staff in the Breeding Centre. She was very bright; always quick to pick up new commands and never one to be scared of exploring around.

As Queenie matured, so did her personality. Even as a puppy, Queenie was a very sensible little girl. Her foster carer did amazingly with her, exposing her to a variety of new experience from a young age and helping build her training foundation.

One of the most memorable things about Queenie as a puppy was her extremely long and beautiful eyelashes. Her foster carer said they had never seen anything like this and everyone who met her during their walks were always particularly enamoured!

Queenie was placed in the Medical Alert Dog program due to her love for playing fetch, which has helped her picked up the Hypokit Retrieve almost immediately. Currently, she is learning to push on the 'Emergency Button' when Trainer Carly is laying down on the floor 'unconscious'. She has also learned 'Get Help', where she runs to another person in the house to alert them when their recipient gives them the command to.

She is just as exceptional in her task training, already at the stage where she can alert to the correct low blood glucose level (BGL) scent sample amongst other decoy scents. Soon, she will advance to alerting to low BGL scents on a human body!

'Queenie has a very sweet, quiet and calm nature. She loves to please and is always content to settle by my side or in her crate while I work on my computer,'

said Trainer Carly. 'She is the type of dog you can take anywhere without having a worry. She walks calmly by my side and takes everything in her stride.'

One of her favourite place to go to during her down time is our local dog park. This is where Queenie gets to enjoy a romp around off lead and play with the other trainee dogs.

Queenie also has a soft spot for our residential sheep at work. Whenever she and Trainer Carly pass by the paddocks on their way to the Veterinary Clinic behind the Training Centre, the sheep would eagerly come up to her—and Queenie would greets them with kisses and gentle licks on their faces!

Clover is currently getting ready for her Public Access Test (PAT). She is now venturing into bigger settings such as larger malls like Marion Shopping Centre, a large shopping centre in the Adelaide Suburbs. One of her more memorable moments was her first experience in the elevator. At first, she was unsure about the funny feeling going up and down, however, now, she rides the elevator like a trained professional!

Yakka is starting strong this year!

Yakka has been advancing his scent training to the next stage where, instead of trying to find the low blood glucose level (BGL) scent in sample tubes, he's starting to locate the sample tubes scattered around the room now.

His Trainers are doing this by sitting with the scent on a person, and Yakka has to sniff out which 'person' has the low blood glucose sample. Soon, he will be introduced to the high BGL scent, which contains a different chemical and odour.

Eventually, Yakka will progress to a higher challenge, where his Trainer will hide the scent tubes on their body while in public. This will be exciting!

PSYCHIATRIC ASSISTANCE DOG PROGRAM



Through this program, ALHD will provide Assistance Dogs to Veterans of the Australian Defence Force living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD).

PTSD is a psychological disorder that can develop after witnessing or experiencing a traumatic event, which may include incidents experienced as part of military service. It can cause a person to withdraw from social activities, develop negative or unwanted feelings or thoughts, re-experience traumatic events, and more.

The Psychiatric Assistance Dog program aims to utilise the skills harnessed in our Assistance Dog team and across the organisation over many years of service provision, providing crucial support to Veterans.

A Psychiatric Assistance Dog (PAD), is trained to perform tasks that can assist in alleviating stressful situations that the Veteran may incur. This can be:

- Waking a recipient up during night terrors.
- Physically blocking them to protect their personal space.
- Interrupting fidgeting behaviours that may indicate anxious feelings, such as leg tapping and scratching.

These highly trained dogs provide not just companionship but essential support, helping Veterans regain independence and improve their quality of life.
