

We have seen a variety of breeds over the years, whilst recently staying with Labradoodles and Border Terriers, we welcome Orlando into our family, the first Lagotto Romagnolo to be trained as a Lions Assistance Dog.

He has recently joined the Puppy Program with his foster carers in an exciting step into his future. An interesting looking pup, described by Lyn & Simon (his carers) as looking like Agro from The Muppets, they describe him as easy going, intelligent and loves to be close to humans, all qualities that make a fantastic companion. Meanwhile, his impact on Lyn & Simon is described like he is their child, and that it is a satisfying experience having him in their lives. They would recommend anyone becomes a Puppy Carer as it 'makes an unbelievable difference to their lives'. In the short time Orlando has been there he has already made a difference. We all can't wait to see what the future holds for him.



WHATS HAPPENING AT THE BREEDING CENTRE

It has been a busy few months in the Breeding Centre, we have seen multiple of our Guardian Dogs come through and deliver more future Assistance Dog pups.

We have **Coco** pictured on the left. This was Coco's first litter and she gave birth to two beautiful Labradoodles named Nusa and Morgan.

Secondly, we have **Bonnie**, who also delivered two new pups to the Training Centre. This is not the first time Bonnie had puppies in our Program, before she delivered a litter of an astonishing 11 pups. This time she is mum to Kimba and Tilly.

Lastly, we have **Aria** who is due very soon. This will be the first time Aria has delivered pups before and is expected to be mum to two beautiful Border Terrier pups.

With **EDDIE'S** Public Access Test on the horizon, his training has started to ramp up, but this has not deterred him, he has taken the challenge head on and stayed committed! His task work has seen vast improvement of the past three months with his responses being extremely quick and staying constantly alert whilst training.


His emergency button push has improved drastically as trainer Nick makes it harder for him and no matter what is thrown his way he manages to always impress. Eddie is turning into a skilled Assistance Dog.

Program, being looked after local volunteer Lynda, is one of the sweetest pups we have had come through the Training Centre. Anybody who has the pleasure of interacting with her immediately falls in love with her gentle and compassionate nature.

She is also at the stage of refining her skills in preparation for her Public Access Test coming up soon. She stands out because of her ability to consistently push herself to learn and be better.

Lastly we have **VINO**, who unlike his siblings here, has recently passed his Public Access Test! An achievement any Assistance Dog goes through but is always worth celebrating. Now Vino works towards his task assessment where he is a few steps ahead of his siblings.

By completing his Public Access Test he is one step closer to being homed with his future recipient, and with the way he is going, he is shaping up to be one of the most consistent and capable Psychiatric Assistance Dogs we have had!





MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM INTRODUCING ARCHIE

A milestone for our Medical Assistance Program here at Lions Assistance Dogs, we introduce Archie who will be our first Border Terrier trained in this program.

Archie started full time training in May under the care of Trainer, Sarah. He came into our program as a dual Assistance Dog, being trained Medical Assistance as a priority based on desires from a future potential recipient, but also being trained in Hearing Assistance skills.

Whilst both May and June have been about getting himself oriented, June was a big introductory month for Archie. He really started to settle into life at the National Training Centre in Verdun. At the start, he was a little shy and could get overwhelmed by the bigger dogs in the yards but now everybody is his friend.

Archie started learning the basics and got a grip of tasks such as 'Hypokit Retrieval' for the Medical Assistance Program quite quickly and started learning the proper etiquette on outings. He was also introduced to scent training, a crucial task for any Diabetic Alert Dog.

Whilst it is always quite daunting and confusing for a pup to enter into the world of becoming an Assistance Dog, Archie is proceeding at a very steady pace and is making lots of progress.






As of July, Archie is starting to show everyone around the Training Centre his bubbly personality. He still has the early puppy excitement where everything around him is very new and overstimulating, but he never lets it get in the way of training-he just loves to show his appreciation.

His task work has started to include more, such as the emergency button push (where if his recipient fell unresponsive he would press this to send out an alert message to an emergency contact). With this and the hypokit retrieval, whilst also steadily wrapping his head around the scent training, Archie is doing a fantastic job whilst also starting to learn sounds as part of his Hearing Assistance training.

With confidence built quite strongly over the course of these past few months, Archie is shaping up to become a superstar!



Sherbet was delivered to her recipient in the month of July. Truly a staff favourite, but none loved her more than her trainer James, who has said that Training Sherbet was fantastic! Sherbet was trained as a Hearing Assistance Dog and was one of the most energetic and persistent pups we have had in training for a while.

'She was such a clever girl and could learn everything I was throwing at her very quickly. Such a vibrant girl and just wants to do any type of work!' - Trainer James.

It took James a short amount of time to get attached to Sherbet, and after a couple of weeks the feeling was mutual. A fantastic aspect of Sherbet is how much she loved other people, and how caring she is.

Sherbet showed great insticts when it came to training, as per James, 'She understood the sound work almost instantly, she had such an eagerness to learn and please'.

With these instincts and outstanding behavioural traits, like her drive to locate and alert all the time, We were all so pleased with how she turned out and are not surprised that James has heard only good things from her recipient. She stands out as a perfect example of what we strive to create here at Lions Assistance Dogs!

We are currently looking for more amazing volunteers to help with this program and when asking Lynda what to say to people considering it, she encourages them to just do it. 'The sadness at the end is far outweighed by the love, enjoyment and rewarding experience that you get during the time they are with you' she says there's absolutely no negative to it and it contributes to helping these dog help change someone's life.
